**Course description:**

Examines the history of the Middle East from 1000–1300, in particular Latin Crusade and colonization and native responses. Topics such as acculturation, Holy War and ethnicity will be examined through the course of the lectures.

**Course requirements and evaluation:**

**Assignments** include one 5-page document study based on a primary source from the list provided, one 12-page essay based on the source from your document study. There will also be a map quiz.

**Sections** will begin in Week 3 (Oct. 13); attendance is **mandatory** (more than one unexcused absence and you may not be eligible for credit in this course) and participation will be graded.

**Assignments**

All **deadlines** must be met. Extensions will only be granted for medical or other exceptional circumstances at the discretion of the professor and with provision of supporting documentation. You may submit your assignments any time on the date in question. Late submissions will be penalized 10 percentage points per day or portion thereof. Late penalties will be applied not only to the final assignment due date, but to 'benchmark' due dates also.

All **assignments must be completed** in order to be eligible for credit in this course. Failure to submit any assignment as described will result in a grade of F or "no pass" in this course.

### Map quiz

#### **In class: 10 October**

This will consist of a blank outline map on which you will be required to identify the location of certain towns, cities, rivers, and other physical features.

### Document Study

#### **Choose source: 17 October; Assignment due: 27 October**

A 4–5 page paper analyzing the primary source you will use as the basis for your essay.

### Essay

#### **Topic due: 3 November; Bibliography: 14 November; Outline: 21 November;**

#### **Assignment due: 1 December**

This will be a 12-page (minimum) analytic research paper, based on the document from your source study and additional research. Instructions will be provided in class and on WebCT. You are required to submit your essay topic and bibliography in advance (see dates listed in detailed course outline). This should be a complete, well-structured essay; spelling, grammar and style will be marked. All citations will be made according to “Chicago Style” (see: [www.chicagomanualofstyle.org/tools\\_citationguide.html](http://www.chicagomanualofstyle.org/tools_citationguide.html)).
